### Spring Happenings at Bull's Run Nature Sanctuary and Arboretum

Signs of spring are everywhere! Snowdrops, crocus, daffodils and other flowers are emerging from bulbs in gardens, tiny blue speedwell flowers and henbit are blooming in yards just beginning to turn green, birds are singing to attract mates and declare their nesting territory, and rain (instead of snow) is swelling the creek. A walk before the Spring Equinox usually yields bird songs and forest dwellers' tracks in the mud along the creek. A careful look under moist leaf liter may reward you with a salamander. Wildflower Walks, free and open to the public, will begin on Sunday, March 27, at 2 pm, with 3 others through April and into May. Join fellow enthusiasts for a guided walk to explore the ever-changing forest carpet of colors as the spring ephemerals take advantage of the spring sunshine before the forest canopy develops to shade them.

Other changes are happening, too. Our naturalist, Caedyn Skiff, is looking forward to Spring Tots and learning what treasures the woods have to offer as spring renews the forest and prairie. As the world moves on past the COVID years, we will slowly return to a new normal. The outdoor experience is still available to explore with social distancing enjoying nature. BRNSA will continue to have its gates open during daylight hours, slowly adding more programs to its calendar, so get out and explore!

#### **Notes from the Naturalist**

Spring is the time for planting! As you make decisions about what flowers and shrubs to add to your landscape, consider finding native plants. There are many benefits to planting native, including lower maintenance requirements, supporting native wildlife and pollinators, and attractiveness! Because these plants are adapted for the Ohio soils and climate, you don't have to work as hard to help them grow! They require a little TLC at the beginning, but then you can sit back and watch them thrive. You'll see an increase in our native pollinators visiting your neighborhood, including beautiful butterflies and hummingbirds! These pollinators also help out with your garden maintenance, doing much of your work for you. To help your garden reach its maximum potential, I recommend researching the bloom time of anything you plant, and space it out! Plan so that you can have something blooming for most of the year, and keep your eye out for plants that stay beautiful all year round for some winter interest. Wondering where to find native plants? Many local nurseries in the Greater Cincinnati area offer a wide selection! See the list below to find somewhere close to you!

#### **More Options for Native Plants**

The County Soil and Water Districts (<a href="https://www.warrenswcd.com/">https://www.warrenswcd.com/</a>) do annual spring seedling sales of mostly native species, which is where Bull's Run gets most of it plants to fill in space cleared of honeysuckle. Aullwood Audubon <a href="https://aullwood.audubon.org">https://aullwood.audubon.org</a> has an annual Spring native plant sale. The Midwest Native Plant Society conference and sale occurs each Summer (<a href="https://www.midwestnativeplants.org/">https://www.midwestnativeplants.org/</a>). Keystone Flora in Cincinnati (<a href="http://keystoneflora.com/">http://keystoneflora.com/</a>) is another great source of native plants. There are lots of options! If you have patience and time, seeds and plugs are another affordable option, Prairie Moon Nursery (<a href="https://www.prairiemoon.com/">https://www.prairiemoon.com/</a>) is a great source for prairie flowers and grasses.

#### 2022 Work Days

Happy Spring! We had our first work day on Saturday, March 19, starting at 9:30am. We swept last fall's leaves out of the shelter, planted elderberry cuttings along the creek and collected capsized blue tubes from last spring to reuse later this spring. On future work days we will be removing honeysuckle to make room for new native seedlings we'll be transplanting during April work days!

We supply the tools; just bring work gloves if you have them, and a water bottle. If you are fully vaccinated and boosted, you do not need to wear a mask, but please keep some space between yourself and others. If you are not vaccinated or have concerns about exposure for yourself or others, please wear a mask or ask for a task that allows you more space from other volunteers.
